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## **A WEEK IN THE LIFE**

We are so fortunate to have a new veterinarian in our area (more information below)—Dr. Jan Nicol—with a staff who can handle our needs, either with feral or non-feral cats. This past week presented us with a lot of cat challenges, so as we finalize this edition of Paws Patter, I'd like to share some of them with you. We began our vet

week at 8am on Monday with a 2-3 month old kitten who had possibly been thrown out of a car. She had minor injuries to her face from the pavement and one eye was injured. Dr. Nicol treated her and fortunately for this kitty, there were no serious injuries and she was placed in a foster home. An hour later, we trapped a kitten weighing less than 3 pounds who had been attacked by roving dogs

He had 4 abdominal punctures and globs of infectious material oozing out. Dr. Nicol rushed him into surgery and found the infection was all through his lower muscles but had not invaded the abdominal

walls. He spent 3 days at the vet and his improvement was remarkable. Having been just hours from death, this lucky feline was finally able to go to a foster home with a bag of medicine for the week. By Tuesday morning, we hoped the week in our cat world was about to settle down, and then I got a call from a senior woman who

adopted one of our older cats a few years ago. He wasn't eating—unheard of for a cat who weighs in at nearly 20 pounds—was hiding under the bed and just not acting normal. He also went to see Dr. Nicol, who determined that some blood work was in order and sent

Mom and kitty home to wait for the results. His results show he is anemic, so we will continue to monitor him and hopefully return him

to full health. These kitties were just the beginning—we also spayed/neutered 7 cats. We never know if a feral cat going to be spayed will also have other issues—parasites, injuries, ringworm, etc. so expenses and places to hold these cats are challenging. This

probably was not a bad week considering we have 40 cats/kittens in foster homes and we are actively trapping feral cats at 5 locations, but it indicates how quickly our unexpected medical costs can rise on

a weekly basis. And our precious kitties are very grateful to Dr. Nicol

and her great staff for the time and care they gave us.

As you read this edition of Paws Patter, think about how you can help—be a foster (or new parent) for a specific cat like Buffy, use

**SPECIAL CATS NEED SPECIAL HOMES**

All of our cats are special to us since they live in our homes until they find permanent homes, but we currently have a few cats who really need homes of their own. For any approved adopter during the month of August, we will cut the regular adoption fee in half so that it is only \$32.50 for these perfect cats (except for Buffy who comes with his own special).

**Buffy**—What a beautiful buff-colored, very short haired male! Buffy was trapped in Sahuarita when he was not quite one year old. Buffy was born in February 2010. We trapped him and planned to neuter and vaccinate him, then return him to his colony. We randomly test our ferals for feline leukemia/AIDS (FELV/FIV) and he was chosen—we were very surprised to find out he tested positive for FELV. So what does that mean? Buffy needs to be the only cat or with another FELV cat. He is not contagious to dogs or people, and as you can see he looks perfectly healthy. Our vet believes he has several healthy years ahead, if we stay on top of any viral infections. This is a lovable, but shy kitty, currently living in a small room in a foster home. We will waive the adoption fee AND pay any FELV related bills for the first 12 months if we find the right home. Could also be a long term foster home.

## THE VET'S CORNER

Each edition of our newsletter offers an insightful article about cat care. This month, Dr. Jan Nicol teaches us about conditions in our cat's mouth:

### The Mouth of a Cat

Dr. Jan Nicol

When it comes to a cat's mouth, there are a lot of conditions that appear to be specific only to the feline species. But you knew your cat was special, didn't you?

First, there is that awful condition labeled "stomatitis." It is a widespread inflammation of the oral cavity which may involve only the gums, or go deeper into the jaw bone or other tissues including the back of the throat, inside of the cheeks, soft palate, and tongue.

The extent of inflammation determines how painful the cat is and whether or not the cat will attempt to eat. It is not uncommon to see a cat with a painful mouth sit over a bowl of food and salivate, but not eat. These cats will be poor groomers and show progressive weight loss. Temporary relief is possible only when strong anti-inflammatory medications are prescribed. Treatment of this condition includes full mouth extraction of the teeth. However, some cats with severe stomatitis may continue to have inflammatory problems even after all the teeth are removed.

So what causes stomatitis in the cat? There does not appear to be any one answer to that question. Researchers still consider this syndrome to be "multifactorial." Localized reaction to plaque, stress, diet, viral and bacterial causes have all been implicated. Early detection, medical, and eventual surgical treatment seem to be the best course to follow when this disease is diagnosed.

Another common cat specific oral problem is tooth resorption. This condition used to be called "cat cavities" or "subgingival cavities" and radiographs of affected cats appeared similar to those of human cavities. But this cat dental disease is not simple. Clinical disease is generally seen in permanent teeth in cats greater than 2 years of age (4 to 6 years of age is most common). The tooth enamel starts to be resorbed at the root surface and may travel above the gum line or just stay below the gum until the tooth loosens or fractures. In any event, inflammation and infection of the area around the resorptive lesion may be painful, causing the cat to chew on one side of the mouth, or swallow food whole. Any signs of pain when eating should be investigated as soon as possible. And for your special cat, this may mean examination under heavy sedation or anesthesia.

Both stomatitis and feline oral resorptive lesions (FORL) may cause halitosis and pain in your feline family member. The cause of these conditions remains uncertain. But one thing is for sure, the sooner the problem is identified, the sooner a plan for treatment or control can be developed. So, don't wait until your cat stops eating to have a thorough oral exam. Any signs of pain, selective eating, or salivating may indicate that your feline family member is having

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dental problems and needs medical attention. Because, after all, cats are special, aren't they?

### **VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT – SHARON BOOKER**

In my three years of writing, cat adoption rates went from 60% to 92%. Now I am writing a weekly Mew Interpretation type column to highlight two of Paw's cats in the Green Valley News. I might add, since Bobcat, we've added Holly to our household from Paws Patrol and in August, 2010, Sandy came to live with us. We now have nine kitties ranging in ages from one to over nineteen years.

While I've been totally blind since 1973, it has not stopped me from enjoying kitties, singing in our church choir and authoring two books which, unfortunately, because my publisher went out of business--are no longer in print. I'm thankful that my husband, Thom, is as much of a cat person as I am. He's never refused me when I need a "kitty fix."

### **NEW FUNDRAISING PROGRAM THROUGH BBVA**

We have just enrolled in a new nonprofit program through BBVA Compass Bank, called The Compass For Your Cause, which benefits Paws Patrol when individuals sign up for checking. In a nutshell, here is how it works.
